## What are \*you\* looking for as an organizer?

## Social networks and online organizing

Social networks complement other kinds of organizing and activism

#### Social networks are (potentially) good fo

- Sharing public information (events, actions, alerts) with a broad audience
- Following and having discussions with activists, journalists, politicians, organizations, etc.
- Tracking news
- "Private" discussions (like Facebook groups)

#### Social networks are not good for

- Secure communications. Use Signal!
- Collaborative editing and document sharing (like many orgs use Google Docs for today).
  - Alternatives include NextCloud and CryptPad ... but that's beyond the scope of this talk

## Some open questions in today's political climate ...

- As commercial social networks become government-aligned propaganda machines, how do we create alternatives?
- With protest getting criminalized, how long will public social network organizing be feasible?
- With dissenters getting targeted, how long will sharing news and discussions on public social networks be safe?
- With increasing surveillance, how long will private-but-not-encrypted social network organizing be safe?
- How can we use whatever time window we have effectively?

## Decentralized social networks


Hosted on many different *instances*, running all kinds of different software

There isn't just one Mastodon instance, there are literally thousands

Accounts on different instance can (usually) communicate with each other – often even if they're running different software

Each instance has its own norms, rules, governance, and software

It's very flexible! But also very complex



Terminology note: instances are also called sites, servers, service providers, hosts, ....

## Your org can also run your own instance(s)!

- Hosting services make it possible even if you don't have Linux sysadmin skills
- In principle, this "networked communities" model is the best of both worlds
  - You control the policies for your instance and who your data is shared with
  - Members are part of a community and can take part in the broader conversation
- In practice, there are complexities
  - Potential legal liabilities and new legislation could make things worse
  - Depending on how big your org is, it can be expensive!
  - Moderation is a challenge
  - If you want a range of functionality, you'll need multiple instances e.g., one running Peertube for videos, another running Mobilizon for events, another running GoToSocial
- If you go this route, Mastodon may not be the best choice
  - GoToSocial and Akkoma have key functionality that Mastodon doesn't
  - So do Mastodon forks like Glitch and Hometown, but hosting services don't support them

## Bluesky as a Twitter alternative

- Very Twitter-like feel
- 10 million+ active users, racially very diverse, lots of journalists, more and more politicians
- Owned by a venture-funded startup that even employees describe as a "future adversary"
- "Custom feeds" let you choose different algorithms or create your own
- Bluesky moderation allows a lot of racism and Islamophobia anti-LGBTQIA2S+ bigotry
  - Blocklists and community moderation services can help, but it's not easy to find the right ones
- Blacksky's custom feeds and moderation service are great
  - o although there's also a lot of anti-Blackness
- Accessibility is not good

## Mastodon as a Twitter alternative

- Similar functionality to Twitter, but a different feel
  - Less viral
  - No algorithmic feeds
  - Search is very limited
  - No real equivalent to Black Twitter
- 1 million+ active users
  - lots of trans / queer / non-binary people and techies,
  - not a lot of journalists or politicians
  - o very few Black or Indigenous people
- Accessibility is good once you find the right apps
  - Alt-text on images is very common great for people using screenreaders!
- Many instances are run by coops, non-profits, or even individuals
- Moderation varies a lot between instances
  - What instance you choose has a huge influence on your experience, but there's not a lot of help choosing an instance that's a good match for you
- Anti-Blackness is a problem, as is Islamophobia and antisemitism

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## What about a Facebook alternative?

- Following friends (including friends-only posts)
  - Mastodon, GoToSocial, Akkoma, etc, do this well including long posts on many instances
  - GoToSocial, Akkoma and Mastodon forks like Glitch and Hometown also allow formatting!
  - Bluesky allows following, but it's public-only, and posts are limited to 250 characters

#### Pages

- Mastodon, GoToSocial, Akkoma, etc, have fairly flexible profiles so can work for this
- Bluesky has a bare-bones profile, but might be enough

#### Events:

Mobilizon is very flexible, and compatible with Mastodon, GoToSocial, etc.

## Alternatives to private Facebook groups?

- Some software has the functionality ...
  - Friendica has private groups
  - Misskey and Sharkey channels are similar to private groups
  - o Forums like NodeBB, Discord, and Flarum can have members-only categories
  - GoToSocial, Akkoma, Misskey and Mastodon forks like Glitch and Hometown have "local-only posts", which are limited to people with accounts on that instance, so are an approximation
- You'll probably need to run your own instance for this
  - None of these options allow for private groups with people from multiple instances
- "Island networks" are an intriguing possibility here
  - A group of instances that only federate with each other, so posts are private to the network
  - People would need another account to participate in broader conversations ... but maybe that's not a bad thing?

## 50501: Mobilizon for events

- Political Revolution runs their own instance, events.pol-rev.com
- Local grassroots organizers can create an account, and then create an event
  - There were two different events for the Presidents Day protest in Olympia, oops!
  - o But, it would be easy enough to address this
- People can RSVP to an event
  - With an account on events.pol-rev.com
  - With an account on another Mobilizon instance
  - With an email address
- People can communicate with the organizers from Mastodon accounts
- Before the last round of protests, the site got overloaded and wasn't always available
  - Was it a denial of service attack, or just enthusiastic protestors? Who knows!





## Washington Privacy Organizers: Mastodon and Bluesky for actions and feedback

- Mastodon account: <a href="https://pnw.zone/@waprivacy">https://pnw.zone/@waprivacy</a>
- Bluesky: <u>@waprivacy.net</u>
- Twitter-like approach, complementing other activism tactics
  - Threads including actions and links to relevant articles
  - Polls and open questions to get feedback
  - Tagging accounts and DMing people to try to get boosts for more visibility
  - Hashtags on Masstodon
- Techniques for actions (these work on any social network)
  - "One-click" email directly in the post for example, <a href="https://wa-privacy.net/email-approps-hb1671">https://wa-privacy.net/email-approps-hb1671</a> brings up draft mail to the Appropriations committee
  - Action pages like <a href="https://wa-privacy.net/take-action-peoples-privacy-act/">https://wa-privacy.net/take-action-peoples-privacy-act/</a>
- At least so far, more traction on Mastodon than Bluesky

TAKE ACTION: Support the People's Privacy Act in Washington state! (2/5)

The People's Privacy Act protects sensitive data including racial or ethnic origin; religious beliefs; sex life; sexual orientation; status as transgender or nonbinary; union membership' income level; citizenship or immigration status; health and biometric data; precise location data; and browsing history.

## An idea about moving people as a group

- Start with a <u>Signal group chat</u>
  - If people aren't already on Signal, getting them there is the top priority!
  - You can invite people to a <u>Signal group chat</u> using links and DMs
  - Onboarding is easy and straightforward
- Use the Signal group as an interim solution and for support as people explore other options

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## Signing up on Mastodon

- What instance to sign up at?
  - Resources for choosing the right fediverse instance is a deep dive
- A few of the hundreds of options:
  - pnw.zone: people from the Pacific northwest, open signup
  - mas.to: broad audience, based in Europe, open signup
  - social.coop: a cooperative, need to apply, monthly fee
  - o <u>mastodon.social</u>: the "flagship" instance, run by Mastodon gGmbH, based in Germany
- View it as an initial choice!
  - If you decide it's not a great fit, or find another instane you prefer, you can move

## Getting started on Mastodon - a handful of tips

- <a href="https://fedi.tips">https://fedi.tips</a> has a lot of great resources
- The Explore page lets you see what other people on your instance (and across the network) are posting about and find accounts to follow
- Many people prefer third-party apps like <u>Mona</u>, <u>Ivory</u>, or <u>Tusky</u> to the official mobile apps
  - o <u>phanpy.social</u>, a web app, is my fave both on the phone and the desktop
  - <u>elk.zone</u> is another web app, that has a more Twitter-like feel
  - All these apps work with any Mastodon instance and most are compatible with GoToSocial, Misskey, Sharkey, and other software
- If you use a screenreader, check out <u>Accessibility resources for Mastodon</u> and compatible software
- Alt-text on images is a big part of Mastodon culture. <u>Here's how to do it</u>
- Hashtags are very useful!
- You can find privacy settings under Preferences / Profile / Privacy and reach

## Signing up and getting going on Bluesky

- Signup at <a href="https://bsky.app/">https://bsky.app/</a> or download the app and sign up
- <u>Debbie's unofficial guide to Bluesky</u> has useful getting-started info (and a whole lot more)
- The default "Discover" feed is algorithmic; switch to "Following" if you prefer a chronological feed
- <u>Starter packs</u> make it easy to find people to follow but be careful about doing a "follow all" unless you really trust whoever's put it together
- Blocklists are very useful again though make sure you really trust whoever's putt them together! I recommend Karl Bode's <u>Far Right Accounts</u>, Casey Ho's <u>Coordinated</u> <u>Inauthentic Accounts</u>, Penny Oaken's <u>Bad Faith</u> and <u>Nazis</u>
- Labelers (aka moderation services) are useful too. I use <u>Blacksky Moderation</u>, the XBlock Screenshot Labeler,

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
